COVID-19 Protocols Remain in Place

As the August Evangelist goes to press, Louisiana and St. Mark's remain in Phase Two of the reopening protocol. We are having one Sunday service. Reservations are required by noon Saturday. All attendees must wear a mask and gloves, or use hand sanitizer. Six feet social distancing will continue to be practiced. Communion is taken one at a time and the Host only.

If we have an event in the Cathedral on Saturday, we must worship the following day in the Parish Hall. There will be a funeral in the church on Saturday, August 8, so we will be in the Parish Hall on August 9. Due to the need to completely sanitize the church between any services, something we can't effectively do because the chemicals we would need to use would seriously damage the wood surfaces in the church, the only alternative is to wait seventy-two hours between services. The same protocols used in the church will also be in effect in the Parish Hall.



Cathedral School News

As of this writing, much remains uncertain about the 2020-21 school year due to the ongoing pandemic. It is our intention to be able to offer classes five days per week for all our children, but that will depend upon the situation closer to the start of school. The admin team and teachers



have been hard at work all summer to be ready if and when necessary to resume virtual learning, even though we know it is so important for our children to return to something more normal. Many things about school will have to be different for the foreseeable future. Amongst the hardest of those will be that we will not be able to allow parents or guests into the building in order to limit the risk of contagion. We will also have to alter and perhaps limit our chapel schedule. Special events such as Grandparents Day must be cancelled or reimagined for virtual formats.

One thing that won't change is that we will continue to be a prayerful community. Over the summer Fr. Drew has often sent emails with pastoral prayers for members of our community. Whether or not we gather in the Cathedral for Chapel or not, our days will begin with prayer. We will pray for our families, our friends, our community, our nation, and our world.

As this strange new school year begins, I ask you please to keep the St. Mark's Cathedral School in your prayers. Pray for children who want to play with their friends, hug their teachers, and not have to worry about social distance. Pray for teachers who worry about compromising their own health as they return to school for the sake of their children and who also must continue to learn knew skills to facilitate virtual learning for those children who might have to remain in quarantine. And pray for parents who must have faith in teachers they cannot meet and who must continue to try to balance the competing needs of work, children, and extended families.

Dear Friends,

We are living through a season of discovering truths about God and about ourselves that have perhaps lain dormant for a few generations. We are contributing our own chapter to "living Biblically" as we find the truth

that has shaped our lives and our lips is being tested in the midst of our own physical frailty, in terms of the virus; and the truth of our hearts is being tested by how well we have been grasped by Christ's instruction on how to go about loving our neighbors as ourselves.

Much has been stripped away in the past few months in terms of what it means to be a believer in God. Everyone, young to old, has been introduced to the reality of our mortality in the very times and places where we often think the least about it. The virus, the quarantine, are leaving us precious few places to hide from the eventual leave-taking that we will each make at the end of our lives. Our eventual frailty and mortality is daily before our eyes, or strapped around our faces like a mask.

Much has been called into question in the midst of relationships that we may have taken for granted. For some, the "status quo" of understanding ourselves both racially and socially is changing; I liken it to an old piece of clothing that no longer fits, and is beginning to tear in places. In places it is beyond repair, and it simply cannot take anymore patching and resewing. Something new is needed, and something new is being created, although the process of getting there is painfully frustrating, tedious, and often causes us to question the effort. One of the simple truths of following Jesus is that we do not get to "have" God without also "having" our neighbors. As our communities continue to give voice to the need for changes in the social contracts that we all share, there is an example of listening, and speaking the truth in love, that we might gather from our friend and savior. As we pray and worship week in and week out, day to day, my sense generally is that we are doing so in order to prepare ourselves for the times when we are not living with God simply in the midst of our victories. "The times that try men's souls," {Thomas Paine} are the times that we draw upon our Christian discipline and hope, looking very intently for the ways in which we know that although the world is falling away, the love and presence of God is something that continues to lead us and sustain us.

During such times I am drawn deeply to the thoughts and letters that Paul shared with the infant Church during the earliest years of the Christian journey. That too was a time of social change, a time of persecutions, a time when the desire for certainty might cause many to find the invitation of God's love rooted in the life, death, and resurrection of Christ a questionable prospect.

I find during times like these the latent sense of urgency with which Paul wrote to early Christians. The sense of urgency in focusing upon "the one thing," that Christ's life, death, and resurrection, our Easter faith, is a light that continues to shine regardless of the ways in which our world continues tearing itself apart only to be recast and propped up again. There is fertile ground within our tradition and our faith for God's presence to be found when we feel that the world around us is being lost.

There is a substance in our faith and our disciplines of how we live together in prayer, in private and corporate worship, that is greater than the temporal vicissitudes we are currently experiencing. As baptized Christians we are upheld by the faith, while practicing the life, of the Risen Christ, each day that we rise and proclaim that such a life and faith point to what we know is most true in human life . . . this is God's world and we are his children living within it; temporal realities will not undermine God's eternal trajectory.

Even though it is just an idea, I may ask permission to have our first Sunday Eucharist when we are gathered together again, post-quarantine, to be a kind of Easter celebration. Over the past few weeks I have returned in my thoughts and reflections to the early morning Easter Vigil in the courtyard of the Cathedral; when we light the Paschal Candle in an open fire, raise it up, and process through our columbarium where so many friends and family are laid to rest. We walk the Paschal Candle through that holy place of memory and rest, and say the words – "The Light of Christ...Thanks Be To God." We pass the Light of the Gospel over the ashes of what has been with a sense of certainty about where our ultimate destination will be.

On that morning, as on so many mornings over the past five months, we are the people who rise and meet whatever the day will bring, carrying the light of the Easter truth in our hearts and minds, as we join with Christians who have gone before. We seek to love God, and we seek to love our neighbors as ourselves, walking in the footsteps of the Carpenter.
