# "What Are You Most Afraid of In Your Life?"

This question written on a white board was the "ice-breaker" for a recent Education for Ministry (EFM) meeting. It is not an easy question to answer, especially out loud in front of others. But it is the sort of question we are challenged to tackle each time we meet. Like good liturgical Episcopalians, we follow a set pattern during our weekly meetings. We begin with prayer, then an ice-breaker question to get us revved up, then a discussion of the week's reading. We follow an ABCD pattern of inquiry - What Amazed you, Bothered you, Confused you, and Delighted you about what you've read?

Then we do a "Theological Reflection" (TR) exercise aimed at applying what we have learned to our lives. Theological reflection sounds more intimidating than it

is. We try to bring in elements from the Culture, from Christian Tradition, and from our own Personal experience, and ask "What is God saying in this? How is He working?" And what is our Action? Instead of separate family lives, professional lives, and spiritual lives, we are reminded that our ministry encompasses these lives

because Christ is present in all of them.

Finally, we conclude

with worship, usually a

prayer. Each week, someone is assigned "worship leader" and is responsible for opening and closing worship/ prayer. Someone else is assigned "discussion leader" and is responsible for guiding our group discussion and theological reflection. Everyone participates, but the bulk of our time is spent in a "ministry of listening" that involves learning from and encouraging one another.

EDUCATION

There are substantial readings every week. In the first year we read the Old Testament, and in our second year we are reading the New Testament. Most weeks we discuss an entire

book of the Bible along with introductory surveys of current scholarship on each book. There are also supplementary texts, most of which are delightful. For example, Dietrich Bonhoeffer on building Christian community in the shadow of Naziism, or Rabbi Abraham Heschel on the transformative impact of Sabbath observance are texts that are worth returning to again and again.

On the other hand, some of the material could be described as trendy, jargony, and politically biased. I must admit, this material challenged my views and set assumptions on many topics. Sometimes it knocked me off balance a bit, got under my skin, put a rock in my shoe. One of the reasons we come to church and study the Bible is

to find certainty in a confusing and uncertain world. Ambiguity makes us uncomfortable. But, as our wise group mentor Fr. Thomas reminds us, ambiguity is not the enemy. If an idea makes us uncomfortable then we are advised to chew on it for a while before deciding what we really

think. This involves more than simply "swallowing the meat and spitting out the bones." It means

vulnerable listening, being willing to be changed by what we read and hear. It is not indoctrination, or even catechesis. Participants do not have to agree with any line of thinking. We are simply urged to keep going, even when we are confounded, persisting in the hope that there is a certainty that lies only on the other side of humility.

MINISTRY

Deep down the reason we keep coming back is not for knowledge or theological insight, but for each other. What a



difference the regular fellowship of our brothers and sisters in Christ can make! The more time we spend together, the more comfortable we are sharing our doubts, confusions, struggles, and personal journeys with one another. We can let down our guard, knowing that we will be greeted with empathy and acceptance. All of us have different perspectives, insights, and experiences. This little EFM community is deeply encouraging, and we help each other along. That alone makes all the weekly preparation worthwhile. As Dietrich Bonhoeffer put it in one of our readings:

"The first service one owes to others in a community involves listening to them. Just as our love for God begins with listening to God's Word, the beginning of love for others is learning to listen to them. God's love for us is shown by the fact that God not only gives God's Word, but also lends us God's ear... Christians who can no longer listen to one another will soon no longer be listening to God either."

So, what are you most afraid of in your life? Your answer may be in EfM. Come and join us on this journey and you will not regret it.




