Dear Friends and Families of St. Mark's,

It's November and the next three weeks mark the end of the green season. The ordinary time of green grass and trees is whisked away in the brisk fall breeze. The change in time is marked by the leaves turning orange, gold, and red, and butterflies lingering near woodpiles for their winter hibernating rest. Nov. 7 provides several marks of change: time itself falls back one hour, marking the shortening of daylight; it is All Saints' Sunday when we will baptize William Dodge McCraw,

son of Gray Hayes McCraw and Emma Hargrove McCraw, at our 10:30 am service. We will remember that day the blessed departed at all of our services to include a 3 pm service at All Saints' Chapel in Stonewall.

Christ the King Sunday, Nov. 21, points to the end of time when the kingdom of Christ will be established fully on earth. It marks a reminder that God, "whose will it is to restore all things in your well-beloved Son, the King of kings and Lord of lords," will "Mercifully grant that the peoples of the earth, divided and enslaved by sin, may be freed and brought together under his most gracious rule" (BCP, p. 236 Collect Proper 29). This is the last Sunday in 2021 ordinary time.

We will gather on Nov. 25 at 10 am for our Thanksgiving Day Holy Eucharist. The turkey is in the oven (hopefully), and all families and guests are welcome to offer praise and thanksgiving for the mercy and love of Almighty God. Please be mindful of those alone this year who may be encouraged by a note or phone call.

Finally, Nov. 28, the First Sunday in Advent, marks the new year for the Church. Blue is the color for Advent, and it reminds us to prepare for the celebration of the birth of Jesus of Nazareth. As disciples of the risen Christ, this is also a time of preparation for the return of our Lord. Our personal preparation can take many forms remembering that "all may, some should, none must." This means we each discern in November our Advent spiritual practices that will serve as our preparation for the return of Jesus Christ. Our personal prayers and confessions, listening and responding to God's invitation, draw us closer to God through our intimate relationships with Jesus Christ. Members of the St. Mark's community will offer meditations for the daily readings in an Advent booklet (thank you, Laura McLemore, for coordinating). The colored candles of Advent wreaths mark words of devotion for the week, and trees may begin to appear in homes in anticipation of decorating for Christmas.

Yes, a lot is going on in November, and for that and more, we are thankful. May our prayers of thanksgiving and praise for Almighty God mark our hearts with compassion and mercy for one another, for those whom we pray, and for those we do not know.



Five principles of godly stewardship:

- God owns everything. Everything means everything. The earth is the Lord's and everything in it, the world and all who live in it (Ps. 24:1). The Genesis creation record makes it clear that God is the sovereign Creator who owns and reigns over the earth. It is also clear that God appointed man to manage this creation (Gen. 2:15).
- The people of God are God's management company. If you are a
 Christian, remember that being part of God's household gives you
 responsibilities to work for the house of God. You enter into a contract
 with God that requires you to be a steward of your part of His creation.
 It is a further obligation that although you are free to make your own
 choices, the choices you make must give God glory.
- Stewardship is responsibility with accountability. God did not create a people to be servants but to be relatives, sons from afar and my daughters from the ends of the earth (Is. 43:6). He receives little glory from having slaves; He receives tremendous glory from people who willingly serve Him as a manifestation of their relationship to Him. God wants to know if you truly love Him, and He intends to test that love by seeing how you respond to the temptation of money.
- Stewardship demands a commitment to others. It is a response to God's goodness to you. Stewardship is not doing something for God with your money, but doing something for others with His money. You act on God's behalf and in His name. The apostle Paul described himself as a slave to everyone (1 Cor. 9:19) and always seeking the good of them. (1 Cor. 10:24, 33). Further he told us to look not only to your own interest, but also the interests of others (Phil. 2:4). Your attitude, Paul wrote, should be the same as that of Christ Jesus, taking the very nature of a servant, being made in human likeness (Phil. 2:5-7). Stewardship is both an expression of your love for God and the realization of that love in your relationships to others.
- Stewardship has eternal consequences. Underlying most of Jesus' instruction is the assumption that your life on earth will prepare you for your future in heaven. Paul explained to the Philippian believers, I am [not] looking for a gift, but I am looking for what may be credited to your [future, heavenly] account (Phil. 4:17). Stewardship builds heavenly treasure by transferring wealth from your bank account to your heavenly account. Because God is eternal, He operates in an eternal time frame. Likewise, the actions of God's stewards will have eternal consequences.


Cathedral School News

I have former students who are nurses, teachers, homebuilders, computer programmers, attorneys, chefs, and nearly every other occupation you can think of. One former student was recently Interim Dean of a Cathedral and just accepted a call as Rector of a large parish with a school! I see my former students engaging in their careers and striving to


