Dear Friends and Families of St. Mark's,

By the time you are reading this we will be in the midst of our Lenten journey for the year. And as many of you know, Lent is a time when many in our faith seek to give God some added attention and amendment of life through efforts that we make in worship, prayer, study, and service. In this vein, we have many parishioners who join us for our daily 7.00am Eucharist in the Chapel on the week-days of Lent. It is a time to discover what our daily lives might feel like when we gather with other Christians to meditate upon Scripture, confess our sins, and join in receiving the sacraments. Others make an effort to join us in Sunday School as we study a particular book or writer who is helping us to follow Christ more

closely. Others undertake an outreach project so that we might participate in being Christ's hands and hearts in the world for those who are hungry, homeless, and without hope. Just as there are a variety of gifts in the Body of Christ, there are a variety of ways that individual Christians accentuate the days of Lent in a journey of "Kenosis," a greek word meaning "self-emptying" so that we might be filled by God's power and presence at Easter.

I have found through the years that many faithful church goers sometimes have difficulty discovering a prayer life that best suits the lives that they find themselves living during the week. The conversation that God is having with each of our souls is utterly unique and irreplaceable; there is a conversation with God meant for each of us within the scope of the mystery of God's presence. There are words and movements from heaven that are meant for us, if we can simply find the "time,

place, and disposition" by which to experience them.

In light of the discovery that we are each created to make with God, our Wednesday Evening Lenten series this year will be "Conversations On Prayer" with the Cathedral clergy. On Wednesday evenings at 5:15pm we will gather in the Parish Hall for Evening Prayer, and meditations on the

We will visit with you about how we have our own conversation with God; both the "grace and the grind" of what it is like to discover, maintain, and grow in our own conversations with God. We will follow our prayer and meditation with a catered supper, so that you might be on your way for the evening. The clergy will be available for deeper conversation and sharing following our supper.



Applying Bible Principles

Think deep thoughts for a moment. Really deep thoughts. Think about the word "stewardship." What comes to mind? If you're like most people, money is what comes to mind. You might even envision the offering plate being passed here at St. Mark's, or writing out your check to support this ministry.

Steve Mizerany used to own a large appliance store in St. Louis. Many people in St. Louis remember him as being a bit eccentric as he moved throughout the store on roller skates, shouting out to potential customers his slogan, "Don't be confused!" That's good advice when it comes to buying appliances. It's also good advice when it comes to stewardship.


Don't be confused! Money is a very important part of stewardship. There are more verses in the Bible dealing with money, material possessions and giving than there are with heaven and hell combined. The Bible has more to say about money than about faith. Even a casual reader of the Bible would have to conclude that money is important to God. But money is not the be-all, end-all of stewardship. It's important all right, but it's only one-third of what we might call "total stewardship."

Total stewardship consists of "three Ts." Money is one of those, the "treasure" aspect of stewardship. "Time" is another, and "talents" complete the picture. Time, talents and treasure comprise total stewardship. How we use these invaluable resources says much about our Christian faith and our relationship to God.

You see, the Word of God is very clear: God owns everything. God has never relinquished the title deed to the world. According to Psalm 24:1, God owns it all. According to 1 Chronicles 29:11, everything in the world belongs to God. That means that all of us own exactly the same amount: Zero. That's right. We own absolutely nothing. We are managers who have been entrusted by God with time, talents and treasure. God is the ultimate Owner; we are managers who are responsible to manage that which belongs to God.


