

Dear Friends.

I hope that you are well and enjoying the prospect of a joyous Easter season following our Lenten journey. I would

like to interest you in a current project that has the hallmark of "death and Resurrection."

A few weeks ago I attended a presentation by St. Mark's members Oliver Jenkins and Skip Simonton about the significant residential "blight" within many neighborhoods of Shreveport. Regardless of whether we live in Highland, Southern Trace, Cross Lake, Spring Lake or Bossier, it is nearly impossible to travel through our city without encountering a few blocks with abandoned and deteriorating housing.

What I learned in Oliver's talk is that these abandoned properties are used as bunkers and depots for any number of illegal activities – from drug storage, sales, and distribution, to prostitution and other illegal activity. The families living near these abandoned houses are subject to the regular traffic and

populace that supports such vice, and those who profit from it.

"We asked the Shreveport Police Department to provide some crime statistics to assess our efforts. The "average calls for service" decreased more than 10% in the six months after the demos compared to the six months prior, and even more dramatic when comparing it to pre-covid numbers where there was a 40% drop. Both the qualitative and quantitative data validated our approach."

Oliver Jenkins and Skip Simonton have created a group called, "Love Your Neighbor," as a means by which to accelerate the demolition of properties designated by the City of Shreveport as abandoned and slated for demolition. This organization is raising money and volunteers to help remove blighted properties, vehicles, and undergrowth that plague the aesthetics and safety of these neighborhoods. The work is being done by The Shreveport Volunteer Network and local contractors willing to take on this important work.

The immediate and visible transformations in these neighborhoods is both creating good will and the potential for some form of reinvestment in these areas; and perhaps most importantly it is reducing the crime endured by the local families. The goal is to accelerate this process.

As a follow-on to our original project, we are actively seeking \$74,000 to demolish another 20 dilapidated homes in inner city neighborhoods. The Mayor has recently announced a campaign to demolish 35 properties across the city. Our initiative is not to compete with the city's plans but rather to augment the effort. The city historically budgets for removing less than 75 structures a year and there are currently more than 375 approved for demolition and more than 1,000 in various stages of property standards violations awaiting determination. Our proposal leverages momentum, demonstrates to the residents and stakeholders that change is possible, and that if people are willing to invest their time, energy and resources, the broader community will support them disproportionately. Waiting several years for the city to remove additional blight would be dilutive to the overall effect.

What Is Education For Ministry?

Education for Ministry (hereinafter EfM) is a four (4) year curriculum for people seeking a deeper understanding of Christian faith and theology. Developed at Sewanee, the class includes the Old Testament, New Testament, Church History and Theological texts written by a diverse group of scholars. Following the academic calendar, one year is dedicated to each of the four topics. The class is limited to twelve people who meet once a week for approximately two hours from September to May to discuss the assigned reading. Each class has a facilitator trained in the curriculum

and methodology of EfM. However, the participants provide the content of each meeting as they share their responses and insights to the assigned material.

In addition to the four substantive topics, the curriculum includes a workbook that guides students through a structured method of theological reflection. The workbook contains techniques to assist students as they

contemplate faith and how it influences them individually and collectively. In short, theological reflections strive to uncover how God, through His Word and Spirit, is incarnate in every aspect of our lives.

One fascinating aspect of EfM is that it is not required that all members of the class be enrolled in the same year of study. Our current class has students in year one, year three and year four. So each week there is discussion regarding the Old Testament, Church History and Theology. Each year's curriculum informs and expands the other topics. Understanding the Old Testament sheds light on the twists and turns in Church History. While even a cursory review of Church History creates insight into how different, authors

approach theology. The four (4) year curriculum fits together like a novel forming a complete story of God's persistent call to each of us.

Personally, the EfM experience has changed my focus from "what" to "how." Prior to EfM I was concerned with "what" does the Bible say about a particular issue or "what" do I believe or "what" does it mean to be a Christian. EfM has persuaded me that a better question to ask is "how." "How" does the Bible reveal God to me and "how" do I live out the abundant life promised by Christ in community? Evolving from an intellectual focus on the facts (as I may perceive them) to a spiritual focus on how God would have me live in relationship

with Him and others has the potential to bring radical change.

EfM challenges its members to consider how we relate to God and how we relate to each other.

By comparing and contrasting the historic communities recorded in the Old and New Testaments and historical Church communities to our

modern society, it becomes apparent that the health or disease of any community is the responsibility of its individual members. Investing time in one another by listening to one another and nurturing that which is most critical to the other person's existence is the way to build a healthy community.

I believe that one of the reasons the EfM program is four years long is that it takes time, sacrifice and commitment to build a healthy community. Committing to the four (4) year curriculum and reaping the benefits of my classmates commitment has been a life changing experience and I hope you will consider joining the next EfM class.


