Dear Friends,

Saturday and Sunday, September 16th and 17th, St. Mark's will host Dr. Jay Wellons, the Cal Turner Chair of Pediatric Neurosurgery at Vanderbilt Medical School. Jay has recently published a memoir of his career in medicine – All That Moves Us: A Pediatric Neurosurgeon, His Young Patients, and Their Stories of Grace and Resilience. His written work has been well received across the country by any living with an oar in the medical community, either patients or medical professionals;

which includes most of us. Jay is also a leader in his congregation, Christ Church Cathedral in Nashville, and a lifelong Episcopalian. Jay and I attended high school together and I am grateful that we have been able to remain in touch through the years.

Many of you are aware of the quote from Frederick Buechner, "Your vocation in life is where your greatest joy meets the world's greatest need." Although it has been a few months since I

listened to Jay's book, I believe that he gives voice to this sacred journey of vocation that each of us take in life. Jay's vocational discernment in giving his life to this most intricate and "high stakes" version of medical practice was like most of our vocational choices; his journey is filled with stories of his late father, mentors, colleagues, false starts and sudden illuminations, and the treasure of wisdom and compassion that he has received from his patients.

Although his memoirs and reflections are not Christian theology proper, his work is resonate with that quality of

spirituality that comes from living life within the frame of a faith in God that we hold, and faith in God that often holds and leads us.


I hope that you will mark your calendars as we welcome him to St. Mark's.



Dean's Sunday School Fall 2023

A journey through Christian History and the experience of the early Church in its discernment and conversation regarding teachings deemed heretical. We will use books and videos from <u>Know the Heretics</u> (KNOW Series), by Justin Holcomb; and <u>History of Christianity: The First Three Thousand Years</u>, by Diarmaid MacCulloch. As in the past, our time together will be a mixture of video, lecture, and conversation. Once we have established attendance I will order books.

From a review on Diarmaid MacCulloch's BBC documentary:

A review by then-Archbishop of Canterbury Rowan Williams for *The Guardian* describes the book as beginning "with what turns out to be one of many tours de force in summarizing the intellectual and social background of Christianity in the classical as well as the Jewish world, so that we can see something of the issues to which the Christian faith offered a startlingly new response.... [MacCulloch] shows an extraordinary familiarity with specialist literature in practically every area." The book is "a landmark in its field, astonishing in its range, compulsively readable, full of insight even for the most jaded professional and of illumination for the interested general reader. It will have few if any, rivals in the English language" and provides "crucial testimony to the resilience of the Christian community in a remarkable diversity of social settings."

From an interview with Rachel Held Evans on Justin Holcomb's "<u>Know The</u><u>Heretics</u>":

RHE: In your book, you essentially define orthodoxy as adherence to the Nicene Creed. It strikes me, though, that the Nicene Creed was developed in a complex historical context as a way of addressing some very specific questions about Christ's nature. Why do you consider that creed so important? What gives it its "staying power"?

JH: I went with the Nicene Creed because of my ecumenical impulse. For Christianity, the Nicene Creed is a historic, globally accepted creed that encapsulates the Christian faith in a short and rich summary. It covers the basic essentials of 1) who God is, 2) what God is like, and 3) how God saves.

I think its "staying power" is connected to that fact that the Council of Nicaea in 325 was a watershed for the Christian church. Shortly after Emperor Constantine legalized Christianity in 313, he convened the first ecumenical, fully representative, universally recognized council of the Christian church.

Another reason it is so important is because the council dealt with one of the most important questions that Christianity would ever have to face—what was the status of Jesus in relation to God? Everyone there agreed that Jesus was a divine being, but the Arians could not reconcile the idea that he was the same being as God the Father.
